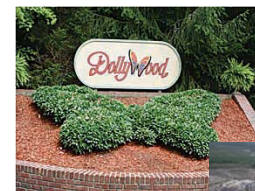

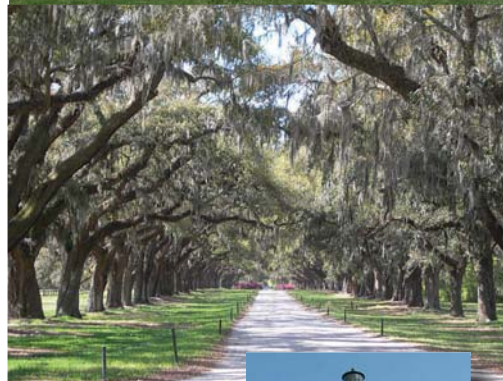

Our first night will be spent in the capital city of Arkansas—Little Rock. Little Rock derives its name from a small rock formation on the south bank of the Arkansas River called *la Petite Roche* ("the little rock"). The "little rock" was used by early river traffic as a landmark and became a well-known river crossing. Little Rock is also the home of the *William J. Clinton Presidential Center* which includes the *Clinton Presidential Library* and the offices of the *Clinton Foundation* and the *Clinton School of Public Service*.

Memphis

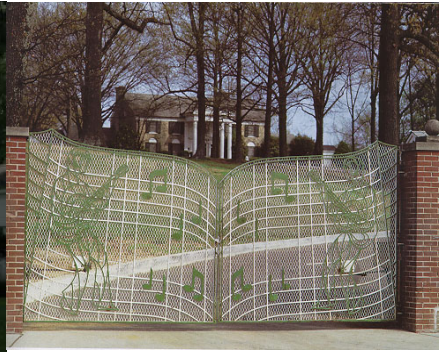
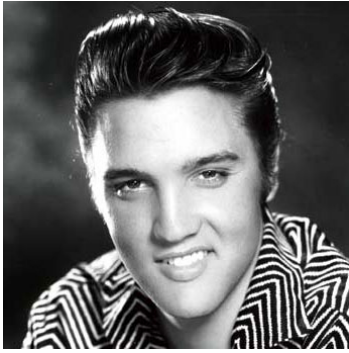
Memphis is the youngest of Tennessee's four major cities (traditionally including Knoxville, Chattanooga, and Nashville). A resident of Memphis is referred to as a *Memphian* and the Memphis region is known, particularly to media outlets, as the "Mid-South."

During the 1960s the city was at the center of civil rights issues, notably the location of a sanitation workers' strike. Martin Luther King, Jr. was assassinated on April 4, 1968 at the Lorraine Motel, the day after giving his prophetic *I've Been to the Mountain-top* speech at the Mason Temple.

Memphis is well known for its cultural contributions to the identity of the American south. Many renowned musicians grew up in and around the Memphis and northern Mississippi area. These included such musical greats as Elvis Presley, Johnny Cash, B.B. King, Isaac Hayes, Booker T. Jones, and Al Green.



Graceland



Although pop-culture icon Elvis Presley has been gone from Graceland and the world for more than 25 years, the King of Rock'n'Roll lives on for millions of fans of all ages. At the 14-acre Graceland estate he built in Memphis, Tennessee, visitors get a taste of the superstar's life and times.

Elvis' life was a classic American success story. Thanks to his seductive, versatile singing voice and incredible charisma, Elvis climbed from poverty to untold riches, from the Depression-era shack where he was born to Graceland Mansion.

Graceland opened to fans and tourists in 1982 and the spirit and taste of Elvis Presley infuse every part of Graceland. Enter the mansion and see Elvis' living room, music room, Elvis' parents' bedroom, the dining room, kitchen, TV room, pool room, and jungle den in the main house. Also open are Elvis' racquetball court and original business office behind Graceland Mansion.

Part of the excitement of the Graceland tour is viewing the extensive collection of Elvis Presley's leather and lamé stage costumes and Elvis' trophy building, which houses his collection of gold records and awards. Career mementos, jewelry, photographs, and other Elvis memorabilia are on exhibit. The tour lets out in the Meditation Garden, where Elvis and members of his family are buried. Countless flowers are put here, daily, by fans from around the world.

The Lisa Marie

On April 17, 1975, Elvis bought a converted Convair 880 jet (original passenger capacity: 100), after her. He rechristened it the **Lisa Marie**. It is currently on exhibit at the Graceland mansion museum.



Mississippi

Tupelo - 1 Night

Located in the hills of Northeast Mississippi, Tupelo charms visitors with a unique blend of fascinating history, interesting attractions, diverse recreation, and a variety of shopping venues. Tupelo is known as the Birthplace of Elvis Presley. Some other historical attractions promote the region's history, honor our men and women's military dedication and describe Tupelo's involvement in Civil War.



Elvis Presley Birthplace

The most significant landmark of Tupelo's modern history is a modest, two-room house where the King of Rock & Roll was born on January 8, 1935. From this humble beginning, Elvis Presley began his swift rise to become the world's most popular entertainer.

The house, built by his father with \$180, draws over 50,000 visitors each year from across the world. Tupelo bought the house and land with money provided from a 1956 Tupelo concert by Elvis himself, who wanted a park for neighborhood children. As an official Mississippi landmark, the birthplace is part of the 15-acre Elvis Presley Park.

Alabama

Birmingham - Birmingham, Alabama is classic southern charm and hospitality. This vibrant, beautiful city is nestled in the rolling foothills of the Appalachian Mountains and serves up nationally recognized dining, shopping and entertainment, world-class attractions, events and other things to see and do.

Talladega Superspeedway - On an unassuming stretch of land suited for soybean farming located next to a couple of abandoned airport runways, crews constructed the biggest, fastest and most competitive superspeedway in the world - Talladega Superspeedway. Since Alabama International Motor Speedway (as it was called until 1989) opened its gates in September of 1969, the track has surpassed every initial expectation in terms of sheer size, speed and competition. Talladega Superspeedway is the biggest, fastest, most competitive motorsports facility in the world. Records for both speed and competition have been established at Talladega. The speedway can accommodate more than 143,000-seated guests and thousands more in the 212-acre infield. Adjacent to the track is the International Motorsports Hall of Fame and Museum.



Georgia

Die-hard Southerners view Atlanta as the heart of the Old Confederacy. Atlanta has become the best example of the New South, a fast-paced modern city proud of its heritage.

Savannah, GA - 1 Night with City Tour!



Savannah, Georgia's First City, sits like a jewel just across the broad Savannah River. This charming city is famous for many things including battles in the Revolutionary War, Sherman's March to the Sea during the Civil War, birthplace of The Girl Scouts, and of course it was made even more famous in John Berendt's book "Midnight in the Garden of Good & Evil." The Waving Girl Statue depicts Florence Martus, whose bitter-sweet story has become a favorite legend among Savannah residents

and visitors alike. Savannah's architecture and history are internationally known, as is its reputation for Southern charm and hospitality; for example, the city's former promotional name was "Hostess City of the South,". Each year, Savannah attracts millions of visitors from across the country and around the world. Savannah's downtown area is one of the largest National Historic Landmark Districts in the United States.



River Street - In the Historic District, the cobblestones that line River Street are ready for visitors to explore the candy shops, art galleries and a number of nautical-themed apparel and gift stores. Move a couple of blocks south from River Street to City Market where art studios, galleries and specialty shops fill the two-block space.



Lady & Sons Restaurant (meal included) - Dine at Paula Deen's family restaurant!

The Lady & Sons restaurant had its humble beginnings back in June 1989 when Paula Deen started The Bag Lady out of her home. The Bag Lady began as a lunch delivery service with Paula's sons, Jamie and Bobby, delivering bag lunches to area business people in their offices around town. As the delivery and catering business grew, The Bag Lady expanded in 1991 into a full service restaurant named The Lady in the Best Western hotel on Savannah's Southside. Eventually, The Lady & Sons would open its doors Downtown on January 8, 1996. In 2003, this growing and popular restaurant went from 85 seats to nearly 330 seats in a new location. The new building is a renovated 200 year-old three-story building plus basement with 15,000 square feet of dining, full service bar and office space.





South Carolina

Charleston, SC

Charleston—a city rich in history, tradition, and Southern culture. Nearly 4 million visitors a year consider the greater Charleston area as their destination of choice, which is no surprise after taking into account its reputation for outstanding accommodations, entertainment, and cuisine.

The Historic Downtown District has stood throughout Charleston's history as the cultural capital of the South and is considered by many to be a living museum, with a wonderful variety of things to do and see.

Andrew Pinckney Hotel—3 Nights

Meticulously restored, the Andrew Pinckney Inn is a Charleston boutique hotel surrounded by over 300 years of history. The hotel gracefully couples old world charm and sophisticated amenities. Overlooking the historic Charleston market area in the heart of the historic district, the Andrew Pinckney Inn is truly "Charleston's Historic Charm...Redefined". As you leave the hotel, you will be able to walk two blocks and be at the open air market where there is plenty of shopping and dining to be done!



MIDDLETON GARDENS America's Oldest Landscaped Gardens

The **Gardens at Middleton Place**, which Henry Middleton envisioned and began to create in 1741, reflect the grand classic style that remained in vogue in Europe and England into the early part of the 18th century. Following the principles of André Le Nôtre, the master of architectural garden design who laid out the gardens at the Palace of Versailles, great attention was paid to woods and water. Rational order, geometry and balance; vistas, focal points and surprises were all part of this garden design.

The Battery
The Battery, located at the southern end of the Charleston peninsula where the Ashley River and the Cooper River meet, is a popular Charleston tourist destination. Things to enjoy and explore in the Battery area include some of Charleston's grandest historic homes, several statues and informational plaques, displays of Civil War artillery, White Point Gardens shaded by majestic live oak trees, views of Charleston Harbor and more. The Battery in Charleston, South Carolina is one of the most beautiful spots in America.

Rainbow Row

Explore one of Charleston's most recognizable districts at the vibrant Rainbow Row, a unique stretch of mid-1700s homes and buildings. These unique homes are vibrant shades of pink, yellows, and blues. The homes were once the center of Charleston's commerce and retail district, and underwent significant renovations in the 1930s and 1940s.

The beautiful row of homes is certainly one of the icons for which the city is most famous. During the 18th century, Rainbow Row comprised the city's waterfront district, as many merchants ran shops and businesses on the first floor, and lived above their businesses on the second floor. Be sure to take a camera along to photograph your own Charleston post cards along Rainbow Row!





The Citadel - The Military College of South Carolina

The Citadel's unique educational experience, combining rigorous academic preparation within a disciplined military environment, has continued to keep pace with the changing nature of our society. During the 20th Century, The Citadel established itself as one of the leading undergraduate liberal arts colleges in the Southeast. Today, the picturesque campus contains twenty-four major buildings. There is an enrollment of approximately 1,900 cadets and nineteen degree programs are offered. Women were admitted into the Corps of Cadets in 1996. The College of Graduate and Professional Studies offers, during the evening and summer, coeducational undergraduate and graduate degree programs. The *U.S. News & World Report* has ranked The Citadel among the best colleges in the region in their surveys of "America's Best Colleges."

Magnolia Plantation

Listed in the National Register of Historic Places by the U. S. Department of the Interior, stately Magnolia Plantation has, for over three centuries, been the original ancestral home of the Drayton family, whose many sons have played important roles throughout American history. It is believed that no other plantation in South Carolina is still under original family ownership from that early date, thirteen generations of the present-owning family having enjoyed it. Besides offering the oldest major public garden in America, it is also America's oldest man-made attraction, having been open to the public annually since the late 1860s. **Considered by many experts to be "the most beautiful garden in the world" for over a century**, its reputation today is enhanced by the fact that, from a purely springtime garden, it is now planted to offer the maximum color possible during every season.



Ft. Sumpter National Park

Site of the first shot of the Civil War. Decades of growing strife between North and South erupted in civil war on April 12, 1861, when Confederate artillery opened fire on this Federal fort in Charleston Harbor. Fort Sumter surrendered 34 hours later. Union forces would try for nearly four years to take it back.



Boone Hall Plantation

This is the plantation that was used in the filming of the ABC mini-series, "North and South."

As you walk Boone Hall Plantation's oak avenue you walk into history. The Plantation was part of a series of land grants from South Carolina's Lords Proprietors to Major John Boone, the earliest grant dating from 1681. As cotton became king of Southern agriculture, Boone Hall, a cotton plantation spread over thousands of acres, became a giant of the Low Country's plantation culture.

Visitors come to Boone Hall Plantation to catch a glimpse of a way of life that is only a memory, of a time when the South lived by agriculture alone and the great plantations were the back bone of the agrarian economy. While on the property, we will have the chance to experience plantation life with a guided tour of the house; visit slave cabins and hear talks on slave life; shop at the gift shop in the 19th century cotton gin; or just stroll through the gardens.



Georgetown, SC

Georgetown occupies a unique place in American history. In fact, some historians claim that American history began here in 1526 with the earliest settlement in North America by Europeans with African slaves.

A seaport village with a collection of homes and churches dating from the 1700s and 1800s, it feels like a previously undiscovered antebellum Mayberry, where homeowners call out friendly greetings to visitors.



Kaminski House

Located in the heart of Georgetown's Historic district, the Kaminski House was built about 1769 .



Brookgreen Gardens

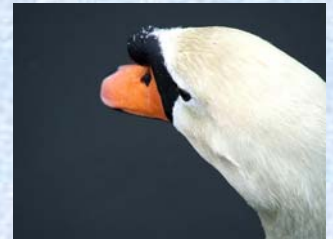

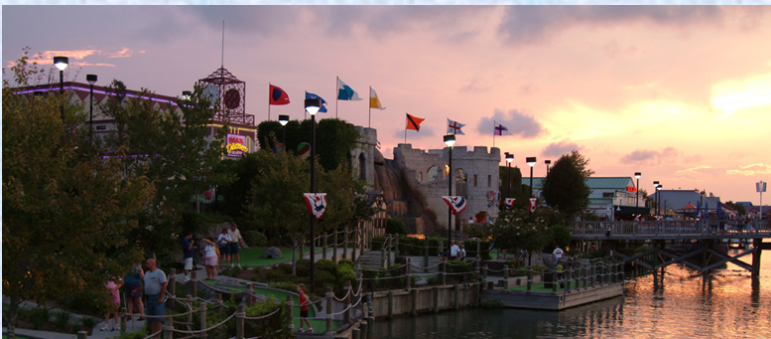

North Carolina

Wilmington, NC

This charming port city is located in the southeastern corner of North Carolina between the Cape Fear River and the Atlantic Ocean. Although not just a tourist town, Wilmington has become a popular destination because of its moderate, four-season climate, historic preservation district, annual events such as Riverfest and the Azalea Festival, and numerous championship golf courses. In addition, nearby Wrightsville Beach is a Mecca for sailors, surfers, sunbathers, beachcombers and seafood lovers.

Standing with quiet dignity and majesty across the river from downtown Wilmington, the Battleship NORTH CAROLINA beckons visitors to walk her decks and envision daily life as well as fierce combat that her crew faced in the Pacific Theatre during World War II. During World War II, NORTH CAROLINA participated in every major naval offensive in the Pacific area of operations and earned 15 battle stars.



Nags Head, NC 2 Nights

When many people refer to the Outer Banks, they use the term "Nags Head" to generically describe the area. The truth of the matter is that Nags Head was first a physical location on a map, then a township, and finally, the most recognizable of all the northern Outer Banks vacation destinations.

Wright Brothers National Memorial

Containing a recently refurbished replica of the original Wright Flyer as well as other memorabilia of the First Flight, the Wright Brothers National Memorial and Visitor Center commemorates one of America's historic moments. The memorial contains about 425 acres. It embraces the actual site of the first four flights and the sites of most of the glider experiments.



Kill Devil Hills

At one time, the northern Outer Banks was characterized by a series of sand mountains over 100 feet high. Kill Devil Hills was one of the larger of the dunes, and stories about how the monolith got its name are varied and colorful; the generally accepted one is that it is named for "Kill Devil," a brand of rum found washed ashore during the colonial period.



Whatever the origins of its name, the dune was the site of the Wright Brothers first heavier-than-air flight in 1903. In the 1930s, workers planted hearty grasses on the dune to prevent it from continually shifting, then constructed the impressive Wright Brothers Memorial which is visible for miles. Atop Kill Devil Hills stands the striking Wright memorial shaft, a triangular pylon 60 feet high, made of gray granite.

Kitty Hawk, NC

Kitty Hawk was made famous on December 17, 1903, when the Wright brothers made their first flight. Located on the Outer Banks of North Carolina, the Town of Kitty Hawk offers year-round residents and visitors alike a unique and relaxing environment. The Town consists of a thriving Village that has been around for generations, a newer beach community of residential cottages, and a maritime forest called Kitty Hawk Woods.

Cape Hatteras Lighthouse

One of the most famous lighthouses in the world. The Cape Hatteras Lighthouse is the tallest in the nation at 208 feet. The lighthouse site houses a visitors center that is open throughout the year and houses displays on the island's maritime history. The beacon from the light can be seen some 20-miles out to sea and has warned sailors for more than 100 years of the treacherous Diamond Shoals, the shallow sandbars which extend some 14 miles out into the ocean off Cape Hatteras.



Bodie Island Lighthouse

Located about twenty miles north of Cape Hatteras Light, it is part of a string of three lights, which includes Currituck Light to the north, that enable a southbound navigator to round Hatteras without incident. Its black stripes run in a horizontal direction in comparison to Hatteras's barbershops. This is the middle light of the Outer Banks three.

The first light was built in 1847. A second light was completed and then destroyed by the Confederates as they vacated the Outer Banks. This was the fate of many lighthouses in the South at the time and was meant to deny Union soldiers any benefit in material or location. The present light was finished and lighted in 1872.

Big Ed's City Market

Through the doors of Big Ed's is pure North Carolina country cooking. A bustling place that is half eatery, half vestige to the old South. It was founded by Big Ed Watkins, who claims some of the recipes were handed down from his great-grandfather, a Confederate mess sergeant. The restaurant is filled with antique farm implements and political memorabilia, including snapshots of presidential candidates who have stopped by.



North Carolina Museum of Natural Sciences

The North Carolina Museum of Natural Sciences is the largest museum of its kind in the Southeast. Through their exhibits, programs and field experiences, visitors have the opportunity to get up close and personal with science and

nature. Featuring an array of permanent and special exhibits, live programs and educational films that appeal to audiences of all ages, the museum encourages visitors to explore the natural world and their connections to it.

North Carolina State Capitol Building

Tour the capitol building of North Carolina. Located in Raleigh, this building was completed in 1840 and is one of the finest and best preserved examples of a major civic building in the Greek Revival architecture style.

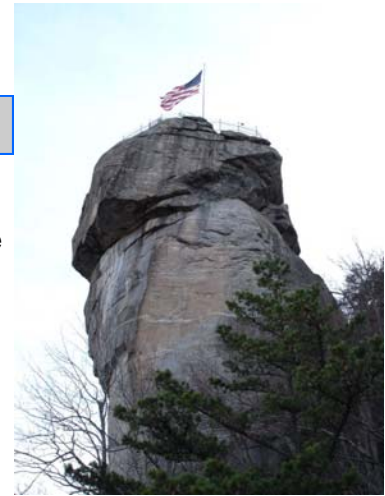


Winston-Salem, NC 1 Night

BILTMORE ESTATE IN ASHEVILLE, NC - The longest home in America



George Vanderbilt created Biltmore Estate in North Carolina's Blue Ridge Mountains more than a century ago as a retreat for family and friends; a place to rediscover gracious hospitality and revel in nature's beauty.

His vision holds true today. Explore Biltmore House, a magnificent 250-room chateau filled with priceless art and antiques. Stroll through century-old gardens designed by America's first landscape architect.

SMOKEY MOUNTAIN NATIONAL PARK

Ridge upon ridge of endless forest straddling the border between North Carolina and Tennessee, Great Smoky Mountains National Park is one of the largest protected areas in the Eastern United States. 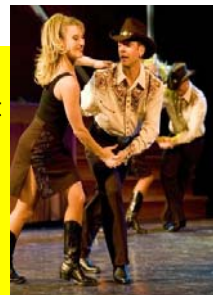
